A series entitled **Messianic Judaism in the New Testament** will be led by **Nathan Joiner**, of Ruach Israel.



“We’ve all heard that Jesus was Jewish, but just how Jewish was he? And what does that have to do with me? In part one of this Bible study (**February 5 and 12**) we will dive into the gospels and look at Jesus’ life, teachings and interactions in the context of a diverse Jewish community in the first century. We’ll look at the significance of Jesus’ participation in Jewish life and take a close look into His interactions with Jewish leaders such as the Pharisees and the Sadducees.

In part two (**February 19 and 26**) we will ask just how Jewish was the Apostle Paul? We will take a look at passages in Acts, Romans, Galatians and others to get to see how he understood his own Jewish identity in light of Jesus’ revelation.

After this class you should have a better understanding of these questions:

“Just how Jewish was Jesus?”

“Didn’t Paul give up his Judaism when he converted to Christianity?”

“So when a Jewish person accepts Jesus, does God want them to continue living a Jewish life?”

“If God had His way, would Gentile Christians become Jewish and observe the law?”

“Where is Messianic Judaism in the New Testament?”

When Elijah heard the quiet voice, he muffled his face with his great cloak, went to the mouth of the cave, and stood there. A quiet voice asked, "So Elijah, now tell me, what are you doing here?" Dear Pilgrims

We have two smoke and CO2 detectors in our house, the battery operated kind that are placed on each floor to warn occupants if there is smoke or high levels of carbon monoxide. When activated they emit this high pitched:

"BEEP, BEEP, BEEP... WARNING, WARNING, EVACUATE NOW, EVACUATE NOW....BEEP, BEEP, BEEP" and then repeat.

Now it's a funny but there are certain things that will inconsistently sent the alarm off. One is turning on the hallway light, how or why I clearly don't know. The second is any spider that decided that their new home is living inside the detector or around its contacts. Apparently spiders can short these things out. Lastly is when my son decides to operate his remote control mini helicopter too close to the detector; which probably has something to do with radio waves. More recently, since the middle of December, the detector has been going off randomly somewhere between 3:30 and 4:30 AM. sometimes twice a week, another every night for three days.....I think.

You can imagine the first time this went off I jumped out of bed, turned on the lights, checked the door for heat, looked for smoke, opened the door and began to investigate. There was no fire, no smoke, the basement detectors did not go off, nor the one at the top of the stairs, just the one on the first floor. I reset the detector and it told me that all levels were normal...false alarm. Two days later; repeat. Blow it out, change the batteries, try again. Two days later: repeat. Then it happened for three

straight nights. Two things happened, one was I simply ignored the alarm and rolled over and second I began to ask my family members if the alarm didn't bother them; they responded "What alarm?"

I'm the light sleeper in the family, do they not hear it? Are they just accustomed to it? Am I going c---y?...well....am I dreaming all of this? Now obsessed with the possibility of a fire where I would ignore the warnings, or, with the possibility that I have sub-consciously imbedded some kind of warning system in my head that awakens me at 4:00 AM, I do what any rational person would do. I get up at 3:00 AM and wait for the detector to go off. The good news is that on one of the three random "recons" the detector did go off; it woke me up as I had fallen asleep in the recliner. Two for three; something's not right.

Something's not right. Sounds simple and sometimes it is. We can find the loose hinge, or the missing piece, we can trace the wiring and identify the current, we can tighten the bolt and adjust the tension, but there are some things that aren't mechanical, but spiritual and they are a little harder to diagnose.

Looks like the Trustees are going to put in hard wired detectors in the house current with existing building codes, that will help. But what about the alarms that go off within us, what do they reveal, what story are they telling, what do we do with them? They are just as "real" maybe even a divine prompting to pause, rest and examine. Don't ignore the quiet whisper or the ringing alarm it may well be God asking "Now, what are you doing here?"

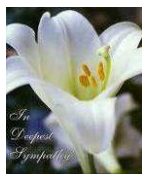
Tuesday Bible Study

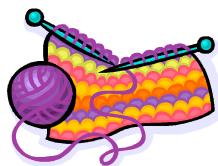

Worship in February

February finds us transitioning from the season of Epiphany to the season of Lent. Lent begins on February 22

In many family and religious traditions Lent has been a time of “giving up something” which as we all know can be difficult to do. Lately, folks have begun to reflect on Lent as a time of adding a spiritual discipline, or a service opportunity or being intentional in acts of mercy and justice. Examples of that might be setting aside time for daily prayer, meditation or reading. Bishop Weaver will often use Lent as a time to re-read Wesley’s sermons and see their application for today. A service opportunity might be for you to volunteer at Bread of Life on Tuesday night here at Carter. Some will practice a “luncheon fast” and then dedicate the money that they would normally spend on lunch to Habitat, World Vision, Heifer, or many other organizations that are feeding and caring for the poor.

It’s a commitment but wouldn’t be it amazing if we all did something and then we could compile a list of the ways in which we used Lent to transform our bodies, our communities and the world. Seems that is one very basic thing that the Christian community could do to walk a life of faith and justice.

Should this be a part of your Lenten journey drop me a note so that I can share these stories with the church as a means of encouraging one another in our walk with Jesus.

February 5th 5th Sunday after the Epiphany

Holy Communion

Isaiah 40: 21-31, Psalm 147: 1-11; 20c, I Corinthians 9:16-23, Mark 1:29-39

God’s awesome power binds all of these scriptures together, but especially the readings from Isaiah and Psalm 147. In 1 Corinthians and Mark, Paul and Jesus utilize the power of God to perform mighty acts and proclaim the message of God’s powerful love. God’s power is seen beautifully in creation, as Isaiah points out. This power is a comfort God offers to us, reminding us of God’s ability to give power to us in our weakness and healing to us in our illness. This mighty power is most miraculously seen in Christ’s acts of healing and casting out demons.

February 12 6th Sunday after the Epiphany

2 Kings 5: 1-14, Psalm 30, I Corinthians 9:24-27, Mark 1: 40-45

Healing and restoration unite these passages. Second Kings and the Gospel lesson offer very different accounts of lepers receiving healing. Naaman is an army commander in high favor with king Aram. He comes to Elisha in power and arrogance and almost goes away uncleansed. Contrast this with the leper in the Gospel, who comes in humility, kneeling before Jesus and begging for healing. Both, in the end, are healed because of their faith—in Naaman’s case, the faith to perform the required actions; in the case of the leper in Mark, by his faith alone. Psalm 30 also speaks of deliverance and restoration. Although they run their “race” in different ways (see 1 Corinthians), both lepers receive the “prize.”

February 19 Transfiguration of the Lord

2 Kings 2: 1-12, Psalm 50: 1-6, 2 Corinthians 4: 3-6, Mark 9: 2-9

The temptation with the Transfiguration story is to overanalyze it. The same can be said about the story of Elijah’s departure. There are so many strange and bizarre details that it is easy to get sidetracked trying to make sense of it all. But the elements of blazing light and intense glory seem to indicate that the mystery itself is part of the gift of the story. God cannot be explained, but even more amazing is the fact that God has invited us into the light. Will we have the courage to accept the invitation?

February 22 Ash Wednesday

Joel 2: 1-2, 12-17, Psalm 51: 1-17, 2 Corinthians 5: 20b-6:10, Matthew 6:1-6, 16-21

We celebrate the beginning of Lent with the imposition of ashes and a call to repentance during this season of reflection and preparation for Easter.

February 26 1st Sunday in Lent

Mark 10:13-16

This Lenten season, you are invited to go on **A Journey to Hope** as we travel with Jesus to the cross, discovering along the way that Hope can be found even as we encounter some of life’s most

difficult circumstances. By addressing real life circumstances we will learn how faith in Christ is relevant to everyday life and how having a faith community can make all the difference.

Week One: **"It's all about the relationship!"** Who is on this journey with you? How can people encourage or discourage you when the going gets tough? This segment tackles the importance of being involved in faith friendships and learning to lean on Christ as the ultimate Friend.

Music for February

The Chancel Choir will **begin February** with an energetic setting of *Psalm 150*, "Praise ye, Praise ye the Lord!" The Choir sings in six parts for most of the piece and on one chord, nine parts! Psalm 150 encourages us to praise God with lots of instruments: "trumpet; lyre and harp; strings and flutes; clanging, clashing cymbals!" The nine parts on the word "cymbals" actually sound like cymbals! The composer, Dr. Paul Basler, wrote the piece for choir, piano, and French horn; Greg Bayse will play the instrument part on his bassoon. This anthem is a challenging and exuberant song of praise to God.

The Children's Choir with Tim McCleary and John Olson will sing for our worship service on **February 12th**. Their song will be *Pass It On*, by Kurt Kaiser. We will surely experience the "spark" of God's love as our children sing this delightful faith song.

The Choir and I have received requests to provide an anthem once in a while that invites the congregation to sing along with the Choir. On **February 12th**, we will do just that: the anthem is a setting of *God of Grace and God of Glory*, by Don Schlosser, based on the familiar hymn tune Rhonda, by John Hughes. In the beginning of the piece, the composer has altered the meter and rhythm a bit, but we still hear the familiar strains of the hymn coming through in bold harmonies. Finally, a keyboard interlude invites the congregation to join with the Choir in singing the familiar hymn:

God of grace and God of glory,
on thy people pour thy pow'r.
Crown thine ancient church's story,

bring her bud to glorious flow'r.
Grant us wisdom, grant us courage,
for the facing of this hour.

An exciting coda by the Choir concludes the piece.

For Transfiguration Sunday on **February 19th**, the Choir will sing *Oh Lord, Lead Me to the Mountain*, by Berta Poorman and Sonja Poorman. In the story of Christ's Transfiguration, Jesus led Peter, James, and John to a high mountain. So in this anthem, we ask the Lord to lead us to the mountain, to "higher ground, so that I may see." We pray for "power that comes from above," the power that will guide us along our life journey.


The Transfiguration of Jesus was an event that should have left no doubt in the minds of his disciples that Jesus was special. How interesting when we think of that majestic view of Christ to think that he came down from the mountain and went back to serve the least among us. Ps. 96 will offer *Come As You Are* on **February 22nd**. Popularized by Pocket Full of Rocks, this piece tells of a Christ who is willing to accept us, regardless of our faults and love us anyway. "All your broken pieces, all your shameful scars, the pain you hold in your heart... Bring it all to Jesus, you can come as you are!"

As we begin Lent, the Choir will sing a strong Gospel anthem by Peter Bagley and Howard Boyer entitled *It's My Desire*. Lent is a time when we reflect on our individual lives and strive to live as Christ calls us to live. This anthem states clearly: "It's my desire to be like the Lord." With a strong piano accompaniment and a memorable melody, this music inspires us to "lean on Christ as the ultimate Friend" (from Journey of Hope). This anthem is on the Choir's most recent CD.

The Handbell Choir will play a setting of *Day by Day*, by Anna Laura Page on **February 26th**. The piece begins with a moving introduction in the treble bells, then adds the melody in the inner bells. With several key changes and beautiful embellishments, the melody continues to appear, reminding us that Christ calls us to live the Christian life every day, as "Day by Day" Jesus walks this journey with us.

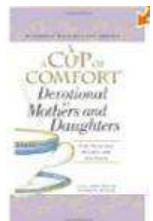
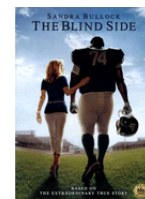

<p>Thursday, February 2– Thursday, March 22</p> <p>in the parlor each Thursday 9:30– 11:00</p>		<p>The world-famous novel about the triumphant story of St. Luke, man of science, and Gospel writer Today St. Luke is known as the author of the third Gospel of the New Testament, but two thousand years ago he was Lucanus, a Greek, a man who loved, knew the emptiness of bereavement, and later traveled through the hills and wastes of Judea asking, "What manner of man was my Lord?" And it is of this Lucanus that Taylor Caldwell tells here in one of the most stirring stories ever lived or written. Lucanus grew up in the household of his stepfather, the Roman Governor of Antioch. After studying medicine in Alexandria he became one of the greatest physicians of the ancient world and traveled far and wide through the Mediterranean region healing the sick. As time went on he learned of the life and death of Christ and saw in Him the God he was seeking. To find out all he could about the life and teachings of Jesus, whom he never saw, Lucanus visited all the places where Jesus had been, questioning everyone--including His mother, Mary--who had known Him or heard Him preach. At last, when he had gathered all information possible, he wrote down what we now know as the Gospel according to St. Luke. Taylor Caldwell has chosen the grand, the splendid means to tell of St. Luke. Her own travels through the Holy Land and years of meticulous research made <i>Dear and Glorious Physician</i> a fully developed portrait of a complex and brilliant man and a colorful recreation of ancient Roman life as it contrasted in its decadence with the new world Christianity was bringing into being. .</p>

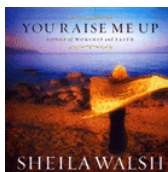

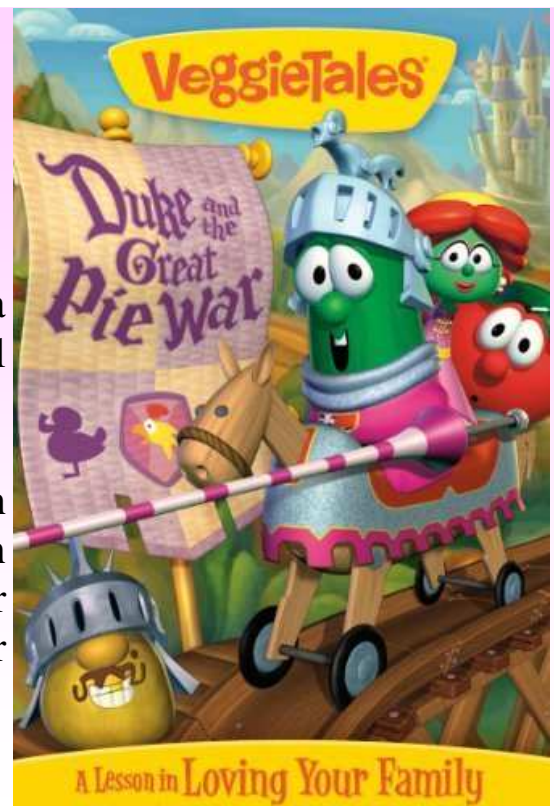
